# MINISTER'S COLUMN

## February 2019

*Tell me about despair, yours, and I  
will tell you mine.  
Meanwhile, the world goes on.*

In her poem “Wild Geese,” Mary Oliver asks us to notice the contrast between what’s going on in our immediate world—our preoccupying and important problems—and the steady reliability of the natural world, where we all have a place. You can find the whole poem in our hymnal (#490) and, of course, online. Mary Oliver died last week. I am writing on the day of the big January snow storm that cancelled our service. Outside my window a coating of ice is forming on every branch.

You have probably heard by now that I am retiring in September. You and I have a little over eight months to go. What shall we do with this “wild and precious” time? (Mary Oliver again.) What is unfinished between us? What do we want to be sure to say and do before this ministry comes to an end?

I’m looking forward to this time of transition. For me it’s a time to focus and pay attention (“Lessons for Living a Life: 1. Pay attention. 2. Be astonished. 3. Tell about it.”) When a minister leaves, people usually have a lot of mixed feelings. Please let me know what you’re thinking and feeling.

The congregation is in the midst of some important work, which I hope we can complete before the end of the summer. We will be considering how to live into the congregation’s new mission. We will be

refining our covenant together and learning what it means to live in covenant. The Board of Trustees is convening a Strategic Planning Task Force to move forward with the congregation’s vision, articulated last fall at our retreat. And the BOT will appoint a Search Committee to find new staff: a Director of Religious Education and a Minister.

Meanwhile our world goes on. Worship services and religious education classes will be offered every week. The youth will gather.

UUCR will be anchored in potlucks and work parties, committee meetings, the pledge drive, the annual meeting. We will offer a UU Curious? class and welcome new members. Our Small Group Ministry theology group will work their way through the 5 Questions. We will carefully follow the potential sale of the Striker Property as it unfolds.

I have confidence in UUCR’s resilience and commitment. We have much to do together before we part, and I look forward to this winter, spring, and summer with you.

On February 10th the youth in our Coming of Age class will lead us in our annual Share the Love Sunday service. This month the class is focused on worship and spirituality.
